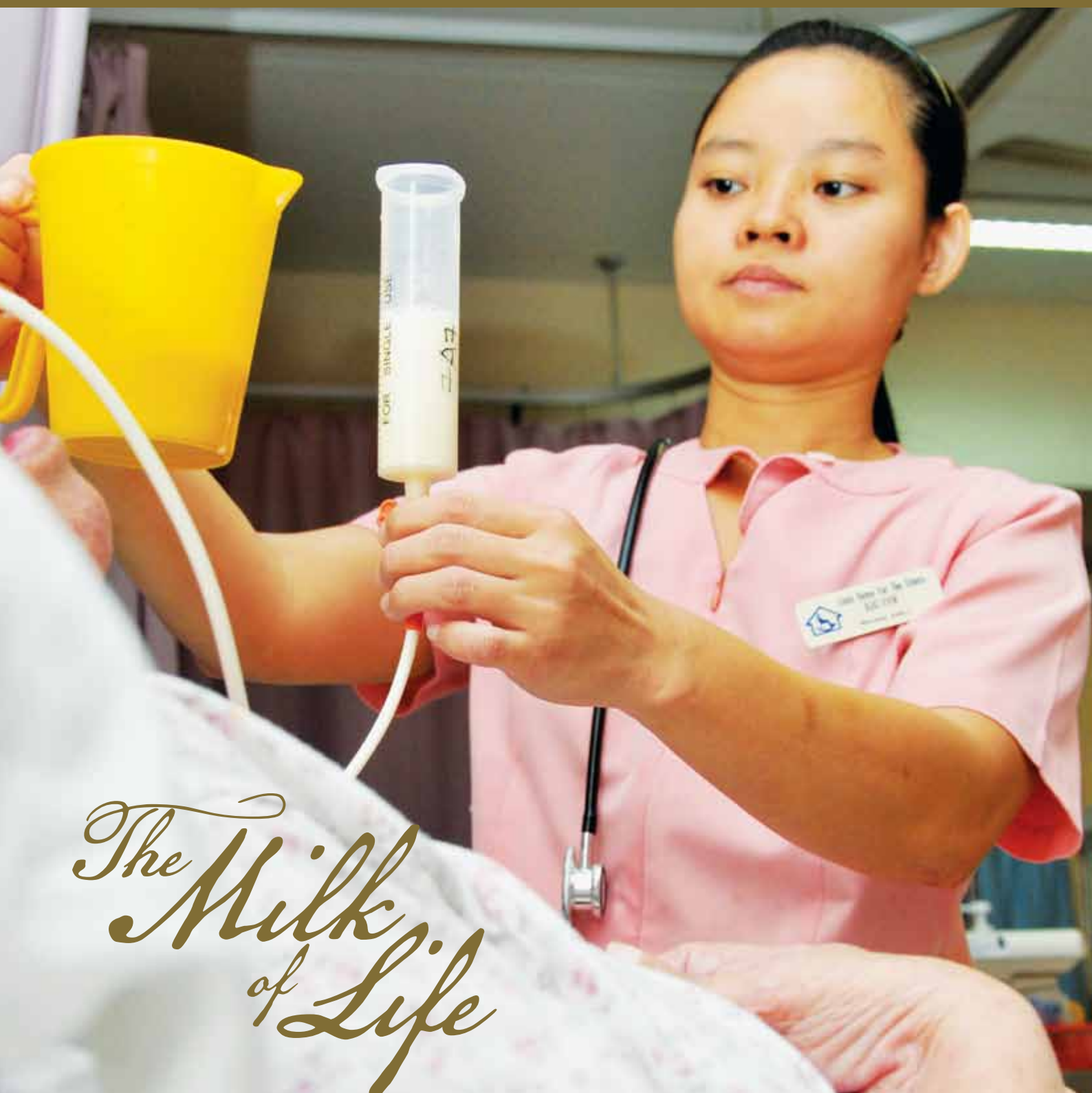

Caregivers are often overlooked and sometimes neglected; not at the Lions Home for the Elders though. Under the guidance of Lion Dianna Lim, club president of LCS Somerset, the volunteers took turns attending to the staff. One of the youngest volunteers, Elaine, was a secondary school student who heard about the project from her mother and jumped at the opportunity to learn and help. SPONSORS FOR RESIDENTS ON SPECIAL DIETS

One of the challenges in caring for the residents is to ensure that they receive sufficient nutrition in their diet as many have diminished appetites due to their medical conditions.

At Lions Home for the Elders, more than 20% of the residents require nutritional supplements in their diets in addition to their regular meals. These milk powders are often added to a drink before being taken orally. For those who have difficulty swallowing or are on life support, their nutritional supplements are administered through nasogastric tubes. These residents often require special diets for their total nutritional needs. Not all nutritional supplements are the same. 'Ensure' is a common nutritional drink which most of the residents who require supplements are taking. However a select few require specific non-standard nutritional supplements, such as 'Glucerna' powder for diabetics and 'Novasource Renal' for those suffering from renal disease, as prescribed by their doctors. The cost of these non-standard nutritional supplements range from \$180-\$350 per month which is beyond the means of some of the family members and those on public assistance.

At the moment, the Home has nine cases of residents who are experiencing financial difficulties due to the high cost of these supplements and require long term sponsors (of at least 6 months) to assist them.
