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

# **BOOMING**Good Health



Ta,ta,ta – ta,ta,ta – ta, ta. The simple rhythm reverberated through the central air well of the Lions Home in Toa Payoh. In the main lobby, a group of residents were arranged in a half circle each holding various types of drums. As the beats of the drums became more synchronized, the drum instructor introduced several variations to the beats, each time sensing the reaction of the residents to this ancient art form. For the next 15 minutes, the instructor, supported by one of the nursing staff, played a soothing rhythmic tune. The happy tune elicited excited dancing by one of the resident who was quickly joined by a staff member. The session ended with another stretching hand exercise. The residents are now eagerly waiting for their next drum session.

This type of drum therapy was introduced to the residents twice a week early this year. The session starts with hand warm-up exercises such as the flicking of hands as well as the massaging and stretching of fingers. The drum instructor then leads the residents in creating various rhythms and different beats. This is followed by each member leading the group in turn to drum according to a rhythm each desires. This exercise gives them a sense of fulfillment and control. The drumming session alternates with breathing exercises and bellowing or hollering – which acts as a form of stress-relief. After about half an hour, another round of hand exercises ensues followed by relaxation break during which the residents rub their hands together to warm them up and then slowly cover their eyes.



### PRISON DEPARTMENT AND LCS TANAH MERAH - 15 MAY 2012

23 young offenders were scheduled to spend their afternoon cleaning the premises of LHE Toa Payoh. For the officers who accompanied them, this rehabilitation programme was an opportunity to assess the ones who were due for release. The few young offenders who were responsible for removing the algae using jet spray however found the jet spray too heavy to manage. The rest however used their numbers to good use and made quick work of cleaning the windows.

By 3pm, the young men began serving tea to the residents on Level 2 and 3. As they went around with the drinks and cakes, there was a noticeable change in their manner. In the Assisted Living Unit on Level 3, two young men helped one of the residents fold rubbish bags into individual packs. What initially seemed a needless exercise, they later learned was actually a form of therapy for her. Another young man listened patiently as an Ah Ma complained that she had not been fed for a few days. Although he had been briefed on the physical and cognitive disabilities of some of the residents, the tears started to well up in his eyes. Another admitted that he was thinking of his own parents as he met the elderly in the Home.

This meaningful session was the outcome of the collaboration between Lions Club of Singapore Tanah Merah and the Prisons Department. As the following quotes from the participants indicate, it may have had a powerful and lifelong impact of these young men.

It was a truly heart-warming, eye-opening and sense-knocking experience!"

"Despite those trying days that I had to go through (in prison), I am much more fortunate compared to the elderly. At least I have a pair of legs to walk on, a pair of hands to eat with and I can clean up after myself in the washroom."
